# Charging or choice?

Transport Minister Rt Hon Rosie Winterton MP will head a strong list of speakers at a regional conference - Charging or Choice? - in Leicester on Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> October.

Hosted by TravelWatch East Midlands, the independent body promoting passenger transport in the region, the conference will examine the problem of road congestion and how it can be resolved.

"Most public reaction so far has focused upon the congestion charge but we wish to address the bigger picture and this conference will hopefully widen the debate," said TravelWatch East Midlands' chairman Alan Meredith.

"Road pricing may have a role to play, but can be only part of a solution for revolutionising transport infrastructure, minimising the problems caused by congestion, improving road safety, and supporting urban regeneration.

"In particular, we are concerned that politicians don't just pay lip service to the need for fast and efficient public transport, but take steps to make it a reality.

"What is needed is not just charging, but a real choice for travellers, with good reliable information to make that choice," he said.

### A call to remove barriers to rail travel

A recent TravelWatch survey of East Midlands rail users (full details of which will be given at the conference) revealed dissatisfaction with the access to rail stations.

#### Often:

- Bus services are poor, badly signposted with inadequate information.
- Station car parks are full, despite being overpriced.
- Cycle storage is badly planned and not secure.
- Access on foot is inconvenient and sometimes potentially dangerous.

TravelWatch East Midlands' rail correspondent Steve Abbott said: "Rail and bus operators need to operate in a joined up manner, providing good connections, with information and help when there are delays."

1. The Conference - Charging or Choice? - will address the likely impact of congestion charging and the extent to which public transport can be a real alternative to the car.
